Learning this technique early in the season gave her an opportunity to see how the plants flourished after pruning. Evelyn would like to work in tissue culture labs, which grow and study plant cells, tissues, or organs in a controlled environment. This internship is important to her because she knows the science but wanted to know about the plants, so plant identification has been an important part of her summer.

The Horticulture Internship project focused on the path to the Contemplative Circle in the Olmsted Woods: designing, creating a sun map and scale map, and plant selection. The interns' goal was to create a relaxing environment using 100% native plants in cool purples and blues. The two horticulture interns carried their love of gardens to their off hours, traveling together to New York City to see the High Line for inspiration.
